

THE NEED FOR OUR SERVICE



Our work with young people

A quarter of all children in Leeds live in the most deprived areas of our city, equating to 36,496 children under the age of 16 who are living in relative poverty.

Only 45% of disadvantaged pupils in Leeds (key-stage 2) are anticipated to meet the expected standards for education, compared to 71% of all other pupils across the UK (DofE).

The numbers indicate a situation in our city, the city of Leeds, that is very worrying. They provide further examples of the pressure on families that live in poverty and how these impact on every aspect of their lives.

The work that we deliver has been, and is developing into a wraparound service, a service that helps our partners achieve more – resources and ideas are shared and through this, outcomes that benefit young people are agreed and then reached.

A safe and happy environment

By providing an environment for young people to learn and enjoy, we hope, working alongside our partners, to alleviate some of the impacts of poverty, but above all, allow the children we work with and support to have some fun, to develop new skills, and to achieve.



Lineham Farm is a place we can take our young people that gets them out of the one square mile of deprivation where they spend 90% of their lives.

Supporting mental health and wellbeing

There is a wealth of evidence which shows that spending time outside in nature has lasting positive effects on young people's physical and mental health.

Confined in a world of limited aspirations, exacerbated by the many barriers that these young people face, they rarely have the opportunity to know they are valued, are able to achieve, and can experience joy and childhood as it should be; carefree and fun.

It's our aim to support those who are less fortunate than others, and to inspire and nurture our future generations to come.

Our work with families

A good deal of our developing work is linked with our partners, to providing space and on-going support for families who are on the edge and at risk of being separated. Figures show that children living in the most deprived areas of Leeds are 10 times more likely to end up in social care than those living in more prosperous areas.

The activities we provide at Lineham Farm, working alongside social support teams, has a proven positive effect on how families function and remain together as a unit, leading to happier, brighter, and more settled lives.

"We have families who arrive with complex needs, and regardless of what is happening in their lives back on the estates, the charity provides a happy, safe, and encouraging environment for them." CHARITY OBJECTIVES

Brightening **Children's Lives**

Our objective is to provide respite and holiday opportunities for children and young people aged between 7 and 11 years old from challenging and disadvantaged backgrounds, who live and attend school in Leeds.

Riding a bike, playing with toys, having a hot meal and a warm bed - these are things that most children take for granted. And yet, for so many living in poverty, they are alien.

Many of the children that come to us have never been encouraged, praised or nurtured. They've never experienced safety, independence or fun. And they've never met anyone else their age with similar challenges to them.

"My favourite thing is seeing children achieve things they thought impossible and overcoming their fears. Be it conquering the climbing wall, learning to ride a bike, or just staying overnight and developing independence."

Our goals:

- Our objective is to provide respite and holiday opportunities for children and young people aged between 7 and 11 years old from backgrounds of challenge and disadvantage who live in Leeds.
- To assist in enabling disadvantaged children of Leeds to realise their full potential for the benefit of themselves (primarily) and the wider community.
- To ensure that children from the most disadvantaged areas of the city have access to respite, encouragement, and learning opportunities in a safe and happy environment.

During a young person's time with us we:

- Show them they are not alone
- Make them feel safe
- Allow them to express their thoughts, fears and feelings
- Teach them that helping others is a good thing
- Instil positive values and behaviours
- Help them make friends
- Let them experience childhood as it should be
- Help them create happy memories



OUR WORK



Outdoor physical activity and experiencing nature can have a positive impact on young people's lives, yet youngsters living in disadvantaged areas face many barriers to participation.

It is well known that children from disadvantaged backgrounds living in deprived urban areas have less opportunities for outdoor play, something which has been variously attributed to parental fear, crime rates, a lack of resources and limited green space in inner-city areas.

The charity's work encourages young people to never stop trying and to believe in themselves and what they can achieve.

How we help

The foundations of every childhood

Working with our partners we help the young people we work with and support experience what every child should: fun; learning in a new environment; developing new skills; taking part in outdoor activities such as riding a bike, climbing, spending time in nature and caring for each other and themselves.

We don't consider these experiences to be luxury, or nice to have; we believe that these experiences and skills are the foundations of every childhood.

PARTNER SCHOOLS



"Children develop resilience, team building skills and are made accountable for some domestic duties."

WINDMILL PRIMARY The centre is used by our partner schools during term time. These residentials are designed around the needs of the young people, with learning outcomes and activities linking back to their formal schoolbased learning and development.

Whilst with us, teachers are encouraged to take part in all the activities with the young people. This provides a very important link between the young people and their teachers, a link that is further developed in school.

The young people who visit from our partner schools have many different needs; a large number being identified as SEND. Because they are from partner schools, the young people are from backgrounds of poverty and the challenges that this represents.

Partner schools. New paragraph - Senior teachers from some of our partner schools have formed a curriculum advisory group. This new group will work alongside the team at the charity and provide information, advice, and support to make sure that delivery continues to provide a link back to school learning but is also FUN.



We have several community-based organisations who the charity regards as partners. These organisations are based in the most disadvantaged communities in the city, and we work with these groups at weekends and during school holidays. This work is a combination of single day, residential or weekend residential delivery.

We have several community partners including:



Family focused welfare teams

The charity has very close working relationships with service sectors such as the MST CAN multisystemic team and Family Action. These agencies work within our target schools and provide referrals for our work with families and young people with caring responsibilities.

We help close the loop on specific family focused work. This ensures our work is not delivered in isolation of other support – it is part of an overall plan for the child or family.

ACHIEVEMENTS

Here are some of the highlights of our goals for 2022 and 2023 which helped us reach over 2000 children, young people and families.

Piloted family support work increasing our sessions with MST CAN and introducing a new scheme for weekend family residentials.

Launched our partnership scheme ensuring that we can work with young people who are most in need.

Added new activity equipment.

Updated the centre's electrical systems and sensors to ensure energy efficiency.

Supported more vulnerable young people during school holidays who often lack access to nutritious food and refreshment.

Replaced carpets and installed new flooring in the main building and the farmers cottage.

Delivered a full year of term time school residentials. working with over 87% of targeted schools.

Introduced a healthy cooking and eating programme teaching over 60 children and families, and providing equipment and utensils to take home.

CASE STUDY

"A chance to breathe, cuddle, feel happy and laugh"

Laura* (mum) has learning disabilities and grew up in the care system. Her two children Alex* who is 11, and Jem* who is 5, also have learning disabilities. They live on one of the most deprived streets in Leeds. The children's father committed suicide shortly after Jem was born.

Laura has struggled to manage her emotions and provide a safe home for her children following this loss. Laura accesses Lineham Farm with her children for respite breaks and days out.

The first visit to the countryside

The family's first time at Lineham Farm was their first ever experience of the countryside. They love Jeff the peacock and the sheep, and Jem likes to run after the ponies. Laura said that she loves the farm and commented on how kind the staff are to her and the children. The sensory garden, the gold fish in the pond, the new picnic area - these are all spaces where the family group enjoyed spending time, and just relaxing.



Laura has gained confidence through her visits to Lineham, and she practices her new parenting skills including giving praise and play. The children jump up and down when they know they have an invite and Alex brings the calendar to their therapist to write down farm days.

Alex can now climb to the top of the climbing wall and Jem is right behind. Laura said Lineham gives her a chance to breathe and cuddle her children. They feel happy and laugh together. For a family with many struggles, these visits allow them to make positive memories which will last a lifetime.

Laura and her children attended the Christmas party at Lineham Farm and described it as the best day out they have ever had. They have pictures from their visits on the living room wall. Laura wanted to say thank you to everyone who contributes to making the place special.

OUR DEVELOPMENTS

Since the covid pandemic, the charity has spent hundreds of thousands of pounds rejuvenating the building. We have installed new carpets, new wooden flooring in the barn and communal areas, upgraded lighting and the kitchen facilities, a new educational nature classroom, a pergola for outside learning, and increased secure and dry storage facilities.

Some examples of what charitable donations have paid for:



New fleet of mountain bikes

New small animal area

CHANGES AT LINEHAM

The history of Lineham Farm is one of innovation, high ideals and a commitment to supporting young people who are most in need. When the centre was opened in 1993, delivery was free. This free delivery could not last for ever however and soon charges were introduced. This led to children visiting the centre who were not in any specific need.

Following the merger of Leeds Children's Charity and Lineham Farm, the Trustees of the charity have made it clear their wish to return to working with the right young people and to reduce the amount that is charged.

The charity, established in 2018, has secured free delivery during the school holidays and also managed to keep any charges made to its partner schools and community groups as low as possible.

Supporting communities and building new perspectives

Children from deprived areas and those who have suffered neglect and abuse, are more susceptible to unemployment, substance abuse, criminal activity and mental illness in their teenage and adult lives. They aren't afforded the same opportunities and support as children from affluent or loving families.

We need to break down barriers and help to build new perspectives and opportunities that are accessible, and not feared. Supporting our communities through the work we provide at Lineham Farm teaches children that helping others is rewarding, and that they can succeed at things.

We teach new skills, instil positive values, and give children the encouragement to reach their full potential. This reduces the likelihood of them having a negative impact on society as adults and shows them how to make a positive contribution to the lives of others.

Future plans

It would be very easy for the staff team at the charity to continue and consolidate its delivery. There is always a balance to be reached between expansion and consolidation and the following has been agreed.

Animals are a very important aspect of life at Lineham Farm. Unfortunately, because of old age or predation some of our animals have died. These are to be replaced. Additional guinea pigs, normal pigs, the farm cat and (when bird flu has been dealt with) a peacock.

To extend and increase the numbers who can use the centre, plans are afoot to develop a new camping area. Facilities will include a new toilet, shower, and cooking facilities, along with a fire pit and activity spaces.
